- VI. WHAT YOU SHOULD/SHOULD’NT SAY.
- VII. CREATE A PAPER TRAIL.
- VIII. YOU CANNOT BE POLITE IN ANY SITUATION THAT YOU EVEN SUSPECT MAY BE IMPROPER.
- IX. IF MONEY IS EVER MENTIONED/DISCUSSED, LEAVE THE MEETING.
- X. SPEAK WITH SOMEONE IN LAW ENFORCEMENT THAT YOU TRUST.
- XI. SEEK OUT AN ATTORNEY WHO SPECIALIZES IN WHITE COLLAR CRIMINAL MATTERS.

meeting




